Mercedes Bern-Klug, PhD, MSW Professor of Social Work and Director of the UI Aging & Longevity Studies Undergraduate Certificate Program. Her areas of social work research include: long-term care, advance chronic illness, surrogate medical decision-making, and the role of nursing home social workers. She is a former Alzheimer support group leader. Dr. Bern-Klug is affiliated with the Iowa Geriatric Education Center, and has been a member of the University of Iowa faculty for over a decade.

Nadia Sabbagh Steinberg, LMSW Doctoral candidate at the Univ. of Iowa School of Social Work with a concentration in Public Health. She has eight years of clinical practice experience as a medical social worker working with diverse populations in oncology, transplant, the emergency department and the Veteran's Administration. Her research interests include: health access and equity, physical and mental health disparities in vulnerable populations including older adults, women, immigrants and people of color.

Goal: Build familiarity with aspects of the Iowa Code related to professional competence, informed consent, and decisional capacity through lecture, case study, and group activities.

The Bundys to the Bradys: Supporting Families Across the Spectrum

Thomas W. Brown, BS, CBIST CEO of Community NeuroRehab of Iowa & Chair of the Governor's Advisory Council on Brain Injuries. He has a Bachelor's in Sociology and has been a CBIST since 1999, providing brain injury training and consultation support to providers and professionals across the country. He has 19 years of clinical and administrative experience in brain injury rehabilitation, with emphasis in supporting individuals who experience severe behavioral challenges.

Benjamin J. Woodworth, MSW, CBIST Director of Training for the Iowa Association of Community Providers with 20 years of experience serving people who have experienced disability. He works with agencies to increase their capacity to serve people experiencing brain injury and challenging behavior. He teaches coursework in the School of Social Work at the Univ. of Iowa. Ben obtained his bachelor's in Social Work from Buena Vista Univ. and his master's in Social Work from Univ. of St. Thomas.

Course Description:

The family system gets a shock when a member experiences brain injury. The fear, confusion, frustration, and desire to protect and advocate can manifest in a variety of ways. Providers and family members will gain an understanding of the affect brain injury can have on the family system, and learn skills and techniques for building reinforcing and cooperative partnerships. Emphasis will be placed on creating environments where everyone can support the individual with a brain injury while understanding how actions and reactions can help, shake up, redefine, and provide healing and resiliency to the entire family structure.

Objectives:

- Participants will gain an understanding of the effect brain injury can have on the family system and individual members
- Participants will learn how to assess each family member's needs and how best to provide individual supports
- Participants will learn promising practices and skills for supporting all family members, from the "difficult" to the "delightful"

Pet Therapy and its Application for the Long Term Care Population

Kari Stock, MS Kari graduated from Northwest Missouri State Univ with a Bachelors in Psychology followed by a Masters of Science in Recreation. Kari is a Recreation Specialist at Mary Greeley Medical Center, serving the Behavioral Health Unit as well as the Acute Rehabilitation Unit where she supervises and coordinates the hospital's volunteer pet therapy program; offering patients the ability to visit with certified therapy dogs and their handlers.
